# **PUBLIC WORKS**

**Sewer Model:** The City received a sewer model showing areas with insufficient sewer capacity in Ward 3. The sewer department is inspecting the areas and clearing any blockages.

**Sewer Outfall:** Yearly Sewer outfall cutting has begun throughout the city. Outfalls are the main trunk lines that carry the majority of the city's sewer into cobb county for treatment. These lines run through wooded areas that follow the stream beds and must be cut and maintained so the sewer lines can be inspected to prevent overflows into tributary waters.

**Valve Maintenance:** Conducting preventative valve maintenance in Ward 5. This preventative maintenance will extend the lifecycle of the City's infrastructure.

**San Fernando Water Line Project:** Work has started on the project including a preconstruction meeting, locating existing utilities, and contractor mobilization.

**Street Department:** The department is gearing up ahead of the possibility of inclement weather later this week

Resurfacing: Public Works is continuing its annual resurfacing contract (80% complete). The roads being resurfaced this year are Campbell Road, Hawthorne Avenue, Camp Highland Road, and North Cooper Lake Road is 70% complete with new asphalt.



#### **SPLOST-Windy Hill**

**Boulevard:** Installing last lift of GAB to get ready for paving on the southern side of Windy Hill. Install stormwater catch basins at Ventura. Coordinate with Atlanta Gas Light to suspend 6-inch gas main at culvert near post office.



**Digital Resources:** Several years ago, Smyrna Library joined a large consortium of Georgia libraries to share eBook and eAudiobook collections. Joining GADD (Georgia Download Destination) allowed the library to provide a greater selection of digital resources to our customers while saving tax dollars. GADD uses the Overdrive Libby app to check out eBooks, eAudiobooks, and eMagazines. In 2021, GADD checked out over 1 million resources to users across Georgia. One overlooked resource in the app is the magazine collection. Scores of popular and special interest magazines are available for check out for adults and children. **New Glass:** The Smyrna Museum was closed the week of January 10 so that the original windows and doors could be replaced. Low-e glass was installed with these new doors and windows to help block ultraviolet and infrared light. UV and IR rays can damage museum objects and fade photographs and ink over time. Low-e glass also helps to keep inside temperatures from fluctuating, which also can damage some types of artifacts. This low-e glass replaces temporary window film that blocked rays in the museum before; the film needs to be replaced every 1-2 years while the low-e glass is permanent.






