

PARKS AND RECREATION

WATER DISTRIBUTION

Training: Utility Manager Marilyn Everett attended training this week on water audit policy and procedures.

Large Meter Testing and Calibration: Large meter testing for commercial and multifamily units began on January 9. Staff tests meters annually to ensure accuracy. Meters range from 2" to 12" serving large complexes and HOA communities. Contractor Reed and Shows will be performing this work throughout the city, including city buildings. Once testing is performed, calibration and repairs will be made if necessary.



Water Valve Maintenance: Crews are performing valve maintenance in Ward 4 to ensure the valves are located and accessible. This maintenance reduces downtime and provides flushing of the system during water main breaks. While performing maintenance, crews are marking valves in the roadway with reflective markings to help staff locate valves when overnight emergencies arise. Projects will be ongoing through 2023.

Closed-Circuit TV Pipe Inspection: Sewer infrastructure is being graded with closed-circuit TV equipment. This technology allows staff to view lines in real time and determine pipe conditions. Staff is marking the direction of flow around manholes and worked on monthly problem areas this week. These monthly areas will be visited for one week every month until the problem areas can be remediated. The monthly list has decreased from 36 areas to 19. Staff has located many areas with issues that need to be addressed with cured-in-place liner. Repairs will be non-invasive with no excavation needed. Upcoming locations to be rehabbed include South Cobb Drive and Spring Road.

Water Main and Service Replacement: Staff is replacing and upgrading outdated water mains and services. Areas are selected after being reviewed for leaks and breaks. Staff is aiming to be proactive instead of reactive to these issues because water mains and services are crucial infrastructures to the community.

PUBLIC WORKS

Streets Department: Staff has been working on the following projects:

- Repaired catch basin tops on Hickory Lane, Concord Lake Road, and Lake Court
- Installed sidewalk and an ADA ramp at the Smyrna Museum parking lot
- Repaired roads on Roswell Street, Dixie Avenue, Daniel Drive, and Shawnee Trail



After a story, Mayor Norton and attendees will design and build their own Tiny Town.





New Artifacts at the Museum: In the spring, Smyrna Museum will debut several new artifacts which will enhance exhibits throughout the museum. Two very special pieces on loan thanks to Lanier Ivester are ticket books for the Atlanta Northern Railway Company (better known as the streetcar). The streetcar started service in Smyrna in 1905 and offered an economical and congestion-easing route between Marietta and Atlanta. These ticket books are rare material objects related to the streetcar system here in Smyrna. We are thrilled to exhibit them.

Business Workshop: Smyrna Library partnered with Economic Development to host a business startup workshop on Friday, February 3, in the library meeting room. Economic Development Director Andrea Worthy presented an hour talk on "Starting a Business in Smyrna" to a crowd of 20 entrepreneurs. Economic Development is already working on a follow-up workshop for later this year.





Black History Month: Smyrna Library kicked off Black History Month festivities with a presentation about baseball legend, Hank Aaron, by author Terence Moore on Saturday, February 4.
