






Speed Reduction Markings: Speed reduction markings were striped on Ridge Road between the intersections of Glenhurst Drive and Ridgehurst Drive. These markings were placed as a traffic calming measure decided upon by the Traffic Calming Committee. Speed reduction markings are transverse markings that are placed on the roadway within a lane (along both edges of the lane) in a pattern of progressively reduced spacing to give drivers the impression that their speed is increasing.

ENGINEERING

Truck Turn-Around Signs: Traffic signs were installed on Concord Road to direct large trucks to the turn-around area before the Concord Bridge. These signs were installed in half-mile increments beginning at Hurt Road and ending at the turn-around area. These signs were installed to prevent premature turn-arounds in residential areas.

SR 280 Resurfacing: The resurfacing project for South Cobb Drive/SR280 consists of approximately eight miles of milling and resurfacing beginning at the Fulton County Line inside I-285 and extending to north of Austell Road. This project began on March 5 and is expected to be completed by the July Fourth holiday weekend. Work is anticipated to be performed primarily during the overnight hours from 9:00 PM to 5:00 AM, Sunday night through Friday night. The initial stages of the project will involve roadway patching.

WATER DISTRIBUTION

Lead Service Inventory: Contractors will be potholing and verifying water service lines on March 6 as part of the water service line inventory for the Environmental Protection Agency's requirements. Verification has been approached in two different ways:

- Water sample kits are being sent to residents in Ward 3 with qualifying homes built before 1986
- Potholing and physical verification will be taking place in Wards 2 and 6 for qualifying homes

Water Valve Maintenance: Crews are performing valve maintenance in Ward 4 to ensure the valves are located and accessible. This maintenance reduces downtime and provides flushing of the system during water main breaks. While performing maintenance, crews are marking valves in the roadway with reflective markings to help staff locate valves when overnight emergencies arise. Projects will be ongoing through 2023.

Closed-Circuit TV Pipe Inspection: Sewer infrastructure is being graded with closed-circuit TV equipment. This technology allows staff to view lines in real-time, determine pipe conditions, and make corrections when necessary. Ward 4 has been completed, and several wards are still in progress.

Water Main and Service Replacement: Outdated water mains and services are being upgraded and replaced around the city. This project includes the area of suspected lead service lines. With ARPA and CIP funding these projects, staff is aiming to be proactive instead of reactive to these issues because water mains and services are crucial infrastructures to the community. Several areas are included in this project:

- The Highlands water main replacement (in progress)
- Roswell Street water main and service line replacement (completed except for tying in new water services and landscaping)
- Starline Drive (in progress)





Cleaning and Updating Sewer Outfall Lines: Staff is cleaning and updating sewer outfall lines. This work will include replacing and installing signs.

Water Meter Replacements: The remaining ³/₄ water meter replacement project will begin on March 6. Contractor Reed & Shows will be replacing outdated meters with new digital meters.
