Raised Pedestrian Speed Table: The Public Works Department began working on a raised pedestrian speed table on Powder Springs Road.

ENGINEERING



Vehicle Detection Improvements: The traffic sensors at the intersection of Cumberland Parkway and Spring Hill Road were reoriented to capture traffic more effectively. There has been periodic vehicle detection issues at this intersection due to the original placement of the sensors. Signal timing adjustments were also made to improve synchronization with the adjacent signal at Cumberland Parkway and Spring Road.

Traffic Cabinet Maintenance: The traffic signal cabinet at Concord Road and McCauley Road/Hollis Street was rewired, and detection zones were adjusted to improve vehicle detection on the side streets.

Speed Studies: Radar signs were deployed on Lake Park Drive, Old Concord Road, and Austin Lake Drive. These radar signs will collect traffic volume and speed data for approximately two weeks.







Various Traffic Signal Light Replacements: Traffic signal lights were replaced in various locations, including the intersection of Spring Road and Jonquil Drive, and the intersection of Atlanta Road and West Spring Street.

Smyrna Recycling Center: The Smyrna Recycling Center processed 107,285 pounds of material in March. So far in 2023, over 308,000 pounds of recyclable material has been processed.

WATER DISTRIBUTION

Lead Service Inventory: Contractors will be potholing and verifying water service lines as part of the water service line inventory for the Environmental Protection Agency's requirements. Water sample kits are being sent to residents in Ward 3 with qualifying homes built before 1986. Potholing and physical verification will continue in other Wards for qualifying homes. Ward 2 has been completed, and the contractor is now moving into Wards 1 and 4

Water Meter Replacements: The remaining ¾ water meter replacement project began on March 6. Contractor Reed & Shows is replacing outdated meters with new digital meters. This project is currently 50% completed.

Closed-Circuit TV Pipe Inspection: Sewer infrastructure is being graded with closed-circuit TV equipment. This technology allows staff to view lines in real time, determine pipe conditions, and make corrections when necessary. Staff is 25% complete with jetting and cleaning for the project, and the video inspection in Ward 5 is 10% complete.

Sewer Main Line Project: Water Distribution held a precon meeting with a sewer contractor to begin cleaning and videoing sewer main lines in Ward 3. This is part of a citywide project to complete sewer inspections in all Wards by the end of 2025. Wards 2 and 4 have been fully completed as part of this project.





Water Main and Service Replacement: Outdated water mains and services are being upgraded and replaced around the city. This project includes the area of suspected lead service lines. With ARPA and CIP funding these projects, staff is aiming to be proactive instead of reactive to these issues because water mains and services are crucial infrastructures to the community. Two projects are currently active in this program:

- The Highlands Water Main Replacement (30% complete)
- Starline Drive (50% complete)

WATER DISTRIBUTION

Water Service Disruption: Water Distribution received a call on Monday, April 3 that the water main at the intersection of South Cobb Drive and King Springs Road had ruptured. Crews isolated the main break within an hour of receiving the call. South Cobb Drive was affected from King Springs Road to Lake Drive on the west side, and from South Cobb Drive to Smyrna Emory Hospital on the east side. Water pressure dropped in various locations in the City as far as Concord Road and even to City limits. Staff quickly hit our redundant valves while dispatching Cobb County Marietta Water Authority to turn on a main feed to level out residuals and allow citizens to begin regaining water pressure in their homes. This was not a fast process, as it took several hours to gain full pressure of 110 PSI to the west side of South Cobb Drive. Unfortunately, the east side of South Cobb Drive remained without water at this time. Water crews isolated a mainline valve at Wexford Apartments restoring full pressure from King Springs Road to the downtown area. This left Wexford Apartments and The Gates of King Springs without water. Water staff came up with a possible temporary solution while contractors remained on-site in an attempt to reach the ruptured pipe that was over 20 feet deep. However, still no results were achieved with the attempted temporary solutions. During this time, the Fire Department came to assist with residents' questions and concerns and be of any assistance to our field operations. At that time, the two communities (Wexford Apartments and The Gates of King Springs) had been without water for over 24 hours. Management came together to review maps and possible connections as a temporary solution. Staff decided to find a hydrant that tied off the South Cobb Drive water main and run a temporary line to the hydrant in the rear of the community. Fire Department and Water Distribution staff jumped into action with fire hoses to hook to the hydrant in the rear of the Smyrna Emory Hospital property and tie into a hydrant at the rear of Wexford Apartments. Water was restored on Tuesday, April 4 at 3:30 PM with the success of this temporary solution. After water was restored, crews began to flush and pull samples to ensure water had adequate chlorine levels.

Contractors are currently excavating for the repairs. On Wednesday, April 5, 48 hours later, contractors were still working to reach the ruptured pipe. Due to the depth and severity of the water main rupture, Water Distribution staff decided to take another approach and re-tap the 20" water main line and reroute a new water main at a suitable depth to provide a permanent source of water supply. The anticipated date for this project to be completed is April 14 due to material logistics.

Water Distribution would like to thank the Community Relations, Police, Streets, and Fire departments for assisting with roadway closure, information, and citizen needs while crews and contractors worked through day and night to restore water.
