

ADMINISTRATION

Citizens Academy: On Tuesday night, Citizens Academy participants met with Jennie Eldredge and Mary Moore to learn about the Smyrna Library and Museum. They were also gifted a copy of the City's 150th anniversary book. Thank you Mary and Jennie for a fun session!





WATER DISTRIBUTION

Lead Service Inventory: Contractors will be potholing and verifying water service lines as part of the water service line inventory for the Environmental Protection Agency's requirements. Water sample kits are being sent to residents in Ward 3 with qualifying homes built before 1986. Potholing and physical verification will continue in other Wards for qualifying homes. Ward 2 has been completed, and the contractor is now moving into Wards 1 and 4.

Water Meter Replacements: The remaining ¾ water meter replacement project began on March 6. Contractor Reed & Shows is replacing outdated meters with new digital meters. This project is currently 60% completed.

Sewer Main Line Project: Water Distribution held a pre-con meeting with a sewer contractor to begin cleaning and videoing sewer main lines in Ward 3. This is part of a citywide project to complete sewer inspections in all Wards by the end of 2025. Wards 2 and 4 have been fully completed as part of this project.

Water Main and Service Replacement: Outdated water mains and services are being upgraded and replaced around the city. This project includes the area of suspected lead service lines. With ARPA and CIP funding these projects, staff is aiming to be proactive instead of reactive to these issues because water mains and services are crucial infrastructures to the community. Two projects are currently active in this program:

- The Highlands Water Main Replacement (35% complete)
- Starline Drive (90% complete)

Closed-Circuit TV Pipe Inspection: Sewer infrastructure is being graded with closed-circuit TV equipment. This technology allows staff to view lines in real time, determine pipe conditions, and make corrections when necessary. Staff is 30% complete with jetting and cleaning for the project, and the video inspection in Ward 5 is 15% complete.

PUBLIC WORKS









Fuel Pumping Reminder: As a safety and housekeeping reminder, please remember the following precautions when refueling at the City-owned pumps at Public Works:

- For minor spills (more than a few drops, less than a big puddle)
 - Oil/fuel absorbent materials are located between the unleaded and diesel pumps (pictured first). Please see the sign labeled "If a Spill Occurs" (pictured second)
- For bigger spills (big puddle or fuel flowing across the ground)
 - Fuel spill containment materials are located at the end of the fuel island by the unleaded pump (pictured first)
- The emergency fuel shut off is located by the front entrance of the PWC building (pictured third)
- There is a fire extinguisher located on the canopy column between the fuel pumps (pictured fourth)

Streets Department Projects: The Streets Department has been working on the following projects:

- Installed an elevated crosswalk on King Springs Road (pictured right)
- Began installing sidewalk on Hayes Drive
- Continued work on the Pat Mell Road sidewalk project
- Repaired a broken catch basin top on Highland Parkway
- Began work on the monthly right-of-way mowing list





LIBRARY AND MUSEUM

First Quarter Usage: Circulation of library materials continues to make gains. The first quarter of 2023 saw a 6% increase in the total usage over the first quarter of 2022. Both print and digital collections increased in usage in the first quarter.





Oral History Project: The library's Oral History Project was initiated eight years ago with the help of the Friends of Smyrna Library and volunteers William Marchione and Mike Terry. Smyrna Historical Society and Smyrna Museum joined as partners and have helped identify subjects and conduct interviews. The library has 13 interviews posted on it's website with six more coming soon. Recently Smyrna Historical Society signed on to help library staff in the transcription of these interviews. New Addition to the Smyrna Museum: The museum collection now contains part of the Concord Covered Bridge! Last week, a donor gifted the museum a shingle that was salvaged from the bridge when Cobb County DOT was rehabilitating the bridge in 2017.

Recycling Center Tour: On Monday, April 10, 14 students and 7 parents from the Atlanta International School toured the Recycling Center. They did a papermaking activity, learned about what can be recycled, and learned how the center works.

Community Cleanup: On Wednesday, April 12, three volunteers picked up 80 pounds of litter, including 14 pounds of recyclable material on Old Concord Road as part of Keep Smyrna Beautiful's Community Cleanup program.

Adopt-a-Mile/Great American Cleanup: This Saturday, April 15, Keep Smyrna Beautiful is having our Adopt-a-Mile/Great American Cleanup. About 180 volunteers are scheduled to go out and clean up litter around the city!

Parks Maintenance: Parks Maintenance staff made great use of spring break week at Brinkley Park by doing some infield renovation work. By breaking up the hard pan infields and adding mix to low areas, the playing surface is softened which makes drainage more efficient.

Spring Cleaning at the Community Center: The Community Center had some much needed work done during the Easter weekend closing. Jonquil Carpet & Floor Cleaning deep cleaned the lobby floors as well as the restrooms near the small gym. Both areas are heavily used, causing stained tile and discolored grout, but they have now been cleaned and sealed and look brand new again!









Spring Break Camp: Parks Programs hosted Spring Break Camp on April 3–7 for twenty excited campers. Participants experienced new adventures each day, including a walk through the trees on a roped course at Chattahoochee Nature Center and jumping the day away at Rockin' Jump Trampoline Park.
