



# FIRE DEPARTMENT

You Don't Know What You Don't Know: A few months ago, the Smyrna Fire Department began working to develop a Community Risk Assessment and Standards of Cover (CRA/SOC) document. The CRA/SOC is developed to help classify risk, establish performance benchmarks, identify gaps in performance, and align internal and external communication with risk and response.

As a part of this process, a survey of internal stakeholders was completed. Input from our internal stakeholders is a critical component in planning for the future of fire and emergency service delivery by our organization. All fire department personnel were encouraged to provide their opinions on the services we offer by completing a short survey. The data gathered through this process was then incorporated into our CRA/SOC. While we wait for the completion of the comprehensive analysis, we wanted to take a moment to share some of the highlights from our internal survey below:

- 92% of fire department personnel provided feedback through the employee survey
- The following is a list of focus areas that respondents believe should be a priority moving forward:
  - Firefighter Health and Safety (40%)
  - Staffing (20%)
  - Apparatus (17%)
- 79% of respondents strongly agreed with the statement: "I am proud to tell other people that I work for the Smyrna Fire Department"
- Morale ratings were as follows: 29 high, 38 good, 8 fair, and 2 poor
- Over half of the responses rated internal communication as good or excellent
- 53% rated their work environment as excellent

# **ENGINEERING**

Roadway Striping Projects: Thermoplastic stop bars were added at each of the all-way stops within the Carrington Park subdivision. This roadway striping improvement was requested by some of the residents to help address drivers running the stop signs. Another roadway striping project is in progress along King Springs Road to tie-in to the recent sidewalk improvements. The roadway striping includes new crosswalks and stop bars at Dunn Street, Cliffwood Drive, and Hayes Drive. Additionally, a mid-block crossing is being installed near the intersection of King Springs Road and Dunn Street which will include a rectangular rapid-flashing beacon (RRFB). The roadway striping is being completed by RP Paving and the RRFB assembly will be installed in-house by our Traffic Signal Technicians. These improvements are intended to promote pedestrian safety and accessibility to Tolleson Park.





**Pedestrian Signal Repair:** Our Traffic Signal Technicians are making repairs to a pedestrian signal that was struck during a traffic accident at the intersection of South Cobb Drive and River View Road. This traffic accident occurred on 9/26.

**Speed Studies:** A permanent radar sign was installed on Old Concord Road to alert vehicles traveling southbound towards Church Road. A traffic study completed in April showed a 5 MPH decrease in the 85th percentile speeds after the installation of the radar sign with the vehicle speeds flashing. The amount of vehicles traveling over 45 MPH also decreased significantly from 10% to 1.1%. Temporary radar signs will be installed next week when Cobb County Schools reopen to collect traffic data on San Fernando Drive, Burbank Circle, Wisteria Lane, and Shawnee Trail per requests from citizens.



## **PUBLIC WORKS**

**Jonquil Drive Storm Drain Rehab:** The Jonquil Drive storm drain rehab is well underway with the new 78-inch pipe installed across Jonquil Drive. The contractor will now start reconstructing the roadway. They have roughly 5 weeks of work remaining.





**Landscaping at City Hall:** Russell Landscape has started the landscape replanting around city hall and should be completed by the end of the week.

**Winter Flowers:** Russell Landscape will be starting on the winter color in all flower beds on October 1. The spring and summer color has been removed.





**Repairs at City Hall:** Parker Young has completed all of the remediation work at City Hall. We are now working with GIRMA on the next steps for remodeling.

**Streets Department:** The Streets Department has been working on the following projects:

- King Springs Road sidewalk project
- Concord Road traffic calming project
- Stormwater system blockages throughout the city
- Continuing the monthly right-of-way mowing list

### PARKS AND RECREATION

### **LIBRARY AND MUSEUM**

**Monday Lectures:** The library is hosting several Monday evening lectures this fall in addition to the normal Sunday Lecture series. Local historian and author Dr. William Marchione began a two-part lecture about the suburbanization of the City of Smyrna. Part one was Monday, September 18, and the conclusion was Monday, September 25. Dr. Marchione discussed the transition of Smyrna from a small agrarian town into the bustling suburb city of today. The next Monday Lecture will be at the end of October, and it will profile notable women in Smyrna's history.

**Creativity Club:** On Tuesday, September 19, the Creativity Club tweens imagined their way into the fantasy world of dungeons and dragons. For several tweens, it was their first experience with role-play gaming. Players created characters, worked collaboratively, and battled their way toward their final enemy, Fedris the Beholder!





### WATER DISTRIBUTION



**Another Busy Week for Water Distribution:** Water Distribution resolved 91 work orders last week from leaks, sewer backups, preventative maintenance and other resident issues.

**Closed-Circuit TV Pipe Inspection:** Sewer infrastructure is being graded with closed-circuit TV equipment. This technology allows staff to view lines in real time, determine pipe conditions, and make corrections when necessary. Staff is currently jetting and cleaning the Queensgate subdivision and should be completed within 30 days. Ward 5 is expected to be completed in March of 2024. The contractor is in the Queensgate subdivision inspecting sewer lines. Ward 2 and Ward 4 are fully completed.

**Lead Service Inventory:** Contractors will be potholing and verifying water service lines as part of the water service line inventory for the Environmental Protection Agency's requirements. Homes in Wards 2, 4, and 6 are completed. Work will begin on the remaining wards soon. Water testing kits are being sent to qualifying homes.



**Water Meter Change Out:** KM Davis is currently changing out the remaining outdated water meters in the city. Water Distribution has roughly 450 meters to convert to 4G as part of the advanced meter infrastructure project. There are roughly 300 meters left to convert.

**Glendale Circle Water Main and Service Replacement:** The Glendale Circle water main and service replacement is 95% complete. This project will improve outdated water quality in the area. KM Davis is performing the work.

**The Highlands Water Main and Service Replacement:** The Highlands water main replacement is in the 15th week thus far with the completion of the Prestwick Drive side of the project. The last section of the project is currently underway on Strathmore Road. This project consists of roughly one mile of water main replacement along with 81 service connections. The project is 95% completed.
