

Vehicle Detection Repair: The cameras used for vehicle detection were repaired at the intersection of Atlanta Road and West Spring Street for the northbound left turn into Smyrna Market Village. Our Traffic Signal Technicians ran new wire from the cabinet pull box along the mast arm to the new camera. Previously, the left turn arrow did not come on for vehicles waiting in the left turn lane. This issue was resolved after the video and wiring was replaced.

PUBLIC WORKS

Holiday Sanitation Schedule: City of Smyrna administrative offices will be closed on Friday, November 10 in observance of Veterans Day. Sanitation collections will move back one day and there will be no yard waste or large item pickup next week. Next week's sanitation schedule is as follows:

- Tuesday routes will be picked up on Monday
- Wednesday routes will be picked up on Tuesday
- Thursday routes will be picked up on Wednesday
- Friday routes will be picked up on Thursday

Streets Department: The Streets Department has been working on the following projects:

- Continuing the King Springs Road sidewalk installation
- Continuing the Concord Road traffic calming project
- Repaired a sinkhole in the roadway at Cobb Circle
- Repaired broken catch basin tops on Belmont Avenue and Prestwick Place
- Repaired a broken drainage structure at King Street and Concord Road
- Continuing the monthly ROW mowing schedule

Energy Recovery Unit: An energy recovery unit is being installed at City Hall this week. Georgia Power and Capitol City Mechanical are working together to install the new unit which will help with airflow issues at City Hall. Pictured is the old unit on the ground and the new unit being installed.

City Hall Construction Update: Parker Young was selected as the vendor to start the reconstruction work at City Hall. We are now working with Community Development on the next steps and inspections needed to make repairs.





Jonquil Drive Storm Drain: A storm drain project on Jonquil Drive is now complete, pictured left.

Landscape Replanting: Russell Landscape has completed the landscape replanting around the library and should begin around the community center in the next couple of weeks. They have also completed the winter color in all beds.





WATER DISTRIBUTION

Work Orders: Staff resolved 50 work orders last week. This includes resolving after-hour calls such as leaks, resident issues, preventative maintenance, and sewer backups.

Lead Service Inventory: Contractors will be potholing and verifying water service lines as part of the water service line inventory for the Environmental Protection Agency's requirements. Homes in Wards 2, 4, and 6 are completed. Work will begin in Ward 3 this month. Water testing kits are being sent to qualifying homes.

Closed-Circuit TV Pipe Inspection: Sewer infrastructure is being graded with closed-circuit TV equipment. This technology allows staff to view lines in real time, determine pipe conditions, and make corrections when necessary. Staff is beginning work in Ward 6, and the contractor is currently working in Ward 4. Wards 1,2,4, and 5 are completed.

The Highlands Water Main and Service Replacement: The Highlands water main replacement is in the 16th week thus far with the completion of the Prestwick Drive side of the project. The last section of the project is currently underway on Strathmore Road. This project consists of roughly one mile of water main replacement along with 81 service connections. The pipe installation is 99% complete, and the contractor is expected to be completed by November 7 with the punch list and landscaping.

Glendale Circle Water Main and Service Replacement: The Glendale Circle water main and service replacement is 100% complete with landscaping set to begin this week. The second phase of this project (Burbank Circle) has begun and is 50% complete.

Water Meter Change Out: The 5-year-long water meter change out project is now completed. All residential meters have been converted to the new Allegro meter (infographic pictured below). The new meters have advanced metering infrastructure capabilities built inside for the city to move forward with the next phase of this project. The second phase of the project will consist of the installation of towers and base stations to capture real-time data of usage for the customers and the utilities office. The new technology will provide the capability to read all meters with the press of a button in the office. This phase is set to begin in January 2024.

Mt. Zion Cemetery: On Thursday, October 26, a memorial stone was installed at the entrance of Mt. Zion Cemetery to honor the residents of the cemetery who do not have individual markers. The names were researched by Museum Manager Jennie Eldredge by combing through death records and by speaking with people in the Davenport and Rose Garden Hills communities. Earlier this year, a fence-mounted sign was added near the street for easy identification of the cemetery.

Tween Game Night: On Tuesday, October 24, Creativity Club tweens travelled back to a time before cars with "Ticket to Ride," a cooperative game where players claim railroad routes between U.S. cities. They loved the strategy involved but especially enjoyed racking up points and drawing the coveted wild cards!
