Water and Sewer staff take immense pride in the installation, repair, and upkeep of 150 miles of sewer pipes and 250 miles of water main pipes throughout the city. Currently serving 15,237 customers, our staff is committed to delivering exceptional service that goes above and beyond, ensuring a safe and clean water supply to every customer.

Sewer and Camera Inspection: This technology enables staff to monitor pipelines in real time, assess pipe conditions, and implement corrections as needed.

- Wards 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6 are completed
- Ward 7 has begun
- Ward 3 is being completed by a contractor

South Cobb Drive Water Main Replacement: KM Davis Contracting has initiated the replacement of the water main along South Cobb Drive. They have installed 2500 feet of 12-inch pipe and are currently identifying all utilities between King Springs Road and the Emory doctor's office. Upon project completion, they will replace a 20-inch asbestos cement (A/C) water main, currently at a depth of over 25 feet, with a 12-inch ductile iron water main at a depth of 5 feet. The depth of these water mains is critical for maintenance and repair purposes.

Creatwood Water Line Replacement: Ardito Construction is actively engaged in a water line replacement endeavor within the Creatwood subdivision. They are in the process of installing services on Mohawk Place and conducting boring activities on driveways along Creatwood Trail. This project encompasses the replacement of 10,000 linear feet of water main and service lines, forming a crucial part of the project.

WATER DISTRIBUTION Customer Tips

Designing a Water-Wise Irrigation System

Here's how to keep your landscape from soaking you! A properly designed drip irrigation system will save you time and money because your system will be more efficient and won't waste water. Learn more about <u>irrigation design</u> and <u>irrigation installation</u> in this AMWUA Xeriscape guide. Here are our favorite design tips:

- Use separate valves for turf and plant areas. Group plants with similar water needs on the same valve. Ideally, trees should be on a separate valve from shrubs and groundcover.
- Make sure a backflow preventer is installed to prevent irrigation water from backing up into your home drinking water supply.
- Avoid oddly shaped or narrow turf areas (under 10 feet wide). These are difficult to water efficiently.
- Install emitters around the dripline of the plant, which is the area under the outside of the plant canopy. Install enough emitters at the correct sizes to wet the root zone. At maturity, large trees may require 12 or more emitters. Small or newly planted trees may only need 3 – 5 emitters. Visit our online <u>Plant</u> <u>Watering Guide</u> for more detail.
- When installing a drip system, don't exceed 200 feet of poly tubing from valve to end cap. Don't exceed a total flow of 200 gallons per hour per valve.
- Don't extend micro-tubing (spaghetti line) more than 6 feet.

Tips for Different Irrigation Systems

Sprinkler Systems

- Sprinklers can use up to 13 gallons a minute, so be sure to set them properly to give your grass the right amount
 of water and adjust the frequency as weather conditions change.
- Water early in the morning to reduce the evaporation rate.
- · If water runs off your yard, split your watering times into two or more sessions.

Drip Irrigation

- This system is good for a small yard or for watering individual plants.
- Drip irrigation is highly effective at supplying one to four gallons of water per hour directly to the soil.
- The advantage of drip irrigation over sprinklers is that there is little water loss due to evaporation or runoff.

Hand Watering

- The simplest and most common irrigation system is a garden hose or a portable sprinkler.
- The advantage of hand watering is that you can easily avoid over watering.
- Use a nozzle to control the flow.

Bubblers

- Bubbler flow rates are in the range of 2 gallons per minute.
- They work well for fruit trees as it floods the entire root system.
- A border or berm will be required to hold the water as it fills up a basin around the plant.




Circulation and Visitors: 2024 is proving to be Smyrna Library's best year ever for circulation of materials. Walkin traffic has spiked dramatically. April 2024 had a 55% increase in attendance over April 2023, and 2024 has seen a 34% increase over January-April 2023 in attendance. Circulation of materials in 2024 is up 11% over January-April 2023. Seven of the last eight months have broken all-time monthly records for the circulation of materials.
