Streets Department: The Streets Department has been working on the following tasks:


- Installed a staging area at the pedestrian crossing at the Atlanta Road and Campbell Road intersection

WATER DISTRIBUTION



Work Orders

- Water Main Breaks: 0

Water and Sewer staff take immense pride in the installation, repair, and upkeep of 150 miles of sewer pipes and 250 miles of water main pipes throughout the city. Currently serving 15,237 customers, our staff is committed to delivering exceptional service that goes above and beyond, ensuring a safe and clean water supply to every customer.

Atlanta Gas Light Cross Bore Project: Atlanta Gas Light is starting a CCTV project in Wards 2 and 3. The project will begin in Ward 2 on a small section and then move on to Ward 3. They will be video-inspecting the sewer mains and laterals to ensure no gas lines are going through our sewer system.

Crossed gas and sewer lines become a concern if a plumber or resident tries to fix a clogged pipe using a mechanical rotary device and puncture the gas pipeline.


Water Service Inventory Verification: This project is almost complete as staff wraps up the last of the inventory.



Water Main and Service Replacement: There are various water main and line replacements happening around the city.

- KM Davis Contracting has initiated the replacement of the water main along South Cobb Drive. They have installed 300 feet of 12-inch pipe and are currently identifying all utilities between King Springs Road and the Emory doctor's office. Upon project completion, they will replace a 20-inch asbestos cement (A/C) water main, currently at a depth of over 25 feet, with a 12-inch ductile iron water main at a depth of 5 feet. The depth of these water mains is critical for maintenance and repair purposes.
- Ardito Construction is actively engaged in a water line replacement endeavor within the Creatwood subdivision. They are in the process of installing services on Mohawk Place and conducting boring activities on driveways along Creatwood Trail. This project encompasses the replacement of 10,000 linear feet of water main and service lines, forming a crucial part of the project.

WATER DISTRIBUTION



Pressure Reducing Valve (PRV): When there is a water main break in the city or water is shut off to your home, it is recommended practice to keep all water spigots and faucets turned off until the water supply is fully restored. One common issue that homeowners experience is turning on water inside the house while the main water line is still turned off. This can lead to sediment from the water line accumulating in the screen of the PRV, resulting in low or no water flow until the PRV is cleaned or replaced.



Run Water After Vacation: A factor that affects water quality in your home is how "stale" the water is. When you leave your home or business for a long time like when taking a vacation, the water in the pipes and plumbing does not move. The best thing to do when you return is to run the water on full blast for thirty seconds to two minutes before using it for drinking or cooking. Also, always use cold water for cooking to draw in fresh water from the outside.

ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

Back-to-School Recycling Tips: To kick off the back-to-school season, KSB will be sharing some school-focused recycling tips and reminders. First up: electronics! If your student is due for an electronics upgrade, don't forget to responsibly dispose of their older device. Phones, tablets, laptops, and other electronics can all be recycled at the Smyrna Recycling Center for free. Fees apply for TVs (\$20) and computer monitors (\$10). The traditional paper decoration from Mexico is used at celebrations and parties. Swapna's program was featured on the <u>Programming Librarian</u> blog so other libraries can replicate the event.

Adventure Begins at the Library: The 2024 Summer Reading program was extremely successful. Participants logged 282,462 reading minutes, up 34% over last year! Story Time attendance was up 17%. Smyrna Elementary and Teasley Elementary had the highest participation rate.







Participants who read (or listened to) 1,000 minutes or more were entered into a drawing of age-appropriate prizes. Prizes included toys and books purchased by the Friends of Smyrna Library and ice cream coupons donated by Marble Slab Creamery in the Village Green. 
ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT
